This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated [Primary PE and sport premium guidance](#).

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

PASS CPD	PASS have continued to give our teachers CPD throughout the year. Their self-analysis documents have shown an increase in confidence across all areas of teaching PE as the year has gone on.	Despite the positive impact that PASS have had, we feel that it is incredibly expensive and not good value for money. Therefore, we have decided to not continue with this next year. We will instead source our CPD elsewhere to ensure that teachers continue to grow in confidence and that our students receive high quality PE lessons.
Grants/ vouchers	As a school we successfully applied for a grant which has enabled us to purchase lots of equipment for playtimes as well as lessons. Through completion of an online CPD course, we also got a voucher for the purchase of tennis equipment.	This has been really helpful as we have only had a limited budget this year to be able to spend on equipment both for lessons and lunchtimes.

Forest School	Each of our classes has attended our Forest School this year which has been incredibly successful. Children have developed their social, emotional and thinking skills during these sessions as well as working in a cross curricular way and being incredibly physically active throughout their days there. 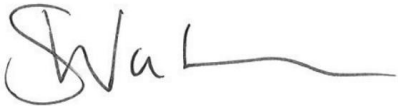
